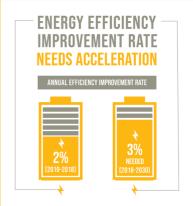

### MODERN RENEWABLE SHARE OF TOTAL FINAL ENERGY CONSUMPTION (2018)









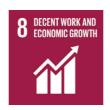

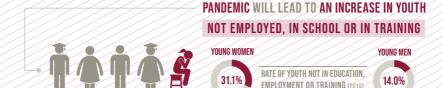

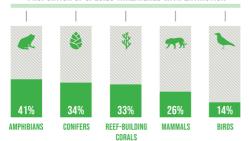

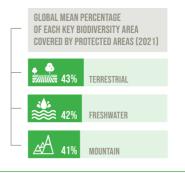

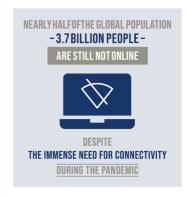
